The response means BMW UK can no longer claim they are unaware of the issue or deny failures have occurred.

It is now on the public record that the UK BMW Motorad Customer Service Manager and Service Manager have been made aware of the issue.

This will assist any other owner who has a failure in the future.

The BMW Customer Service Manager has also agreed that if an issue was shown to exist that BMW would accept liability, this is important for the future as additional information comes to light.

I am aware of one instance in Australia of fork failure in a 2001 model machine where the machine was written off by the insurance company without referral to BMW

May I ask where you obtained the replacement fork housings shown in your (very helpful) photos? Cost? Part Number?

I did a little shopping around and eventually just ordered them from my local BMW dealer. They were about \$300 each (spendy,

but less so than LifeFlight).

I spent quite a bit of time looking around ebay/craiglist but most of the bikes I saw being parted out did not include the forks (which makes sense, since they were mostly being parted out due to wrecks, in which case the forks might be bent). The good-as-new forks I found used were barely cheaper than the new ones from the dealer (and would have had shipping added too). So I bit the bullet and decided just to buy new ones.

The part numbers are the same as the old model but, since the new ones have been around since 2003, chances are you'll get the new version.

Part numbers are 7-651-135 (left) and 7-651-136 (right).

Here's the stampings for the forks; first the old one and then the new one:

The US style tort system is a disaster which only imagines that it would prevent recurrences of such failures. It, among other factors, is a huge parasitical load upon the US economy. I'd not wish it on any other nation and in fact, wish it would go away in mine.


I think you'll note that even if you figure the fork leg issue on F's and the brake failure issues on other models are real, they both exist unmolested in the US just as they do in Germany, France, UK, etc. It's not as if BMW NA leaped into action spurred by Ralph Nader clones and refitted the power assisted brakes with 2007 and later style braking systems. In fact, nothing has occurred. Ditto the F fork legs. AFAIK, no warranty w/o failure has occurred in the US on either of those 'issues' you state.

So forget relief from the parasites infesting the US legal system. I'm disappointed in BMW in a way, but recognize that the cost of addressing these issues makes such addressing probably impossible.

I keep hoping BMW would offer some sort of compromise situation



Hit a RUT and SHEARED off the HANDLEBARS - think on that one before you conclude that the problems occur only on undamaged bikes.

The guy in Oz had just bought the the bike the day before. For all we know, the PO knew he'd damaged the bike or it was put together by the dealership from crashed parts. Again, the implication is that BMW is right here.

I'm NOT saying that this is all from previous damaged bikes failing & it's not a structural thing, but the examples given in the mag article are just plain b.s. They strengthen BMW's position.
